- 1. **Superintendent Office:** Now that Mark Tucker is back part time, we are working collaboratively to ensure the continued smooth operation of the SU. We are dividing up the responsibilities and workload until Mark gets the all clear to return full time. We are both committed to the support of all staff, students, families, administrators and boards.
- 2. Budget: Mark and I have had regular meetings with Mike Concessi to review and develop budgets with as much information as we have available. Mike is working hard to make realistic, accurate projections about both revenues and expenses for the upcoming school year for the SU and each of its districts. We will be attending a two-day conference titled "Effective Practices in School District Fiscal Planning and Management" at the beginning of December. This professional development opportunity is designed for superintendents and business managers, and sponsored by VSA and VASBO.
- 3. **Threat Assessment:** Mark and I attended a webinar through the FBI related to hoax threats. It was informative and timely, given the events that unfolded in Twinfield last month. The webinar was targeted at law enforcement, but provided a useful perspective to us as school leaders.
- 4. PCBs: Mark is continuing his efforts to advance the decision making process for the Cabot gymnasium. Mark has also spoken with the consulting engineer about Corrective Action Plans (CAP) for Danville and Twinfield. The source testing at those two schools suggest straightforward remediation options, but this cannot proceed until DEC has a formal CAP so that they can authorize the removal of the PCB source material. Mark has pressed for this to be resolved before June 2024.

1. <u>CCSU Updates</u>

- a. M. Lawrence Batiste, a remote school psychologist, provided training for our special educators on the November 3 early release regarding patterns of strengths and weaknesses.
- b. Our speech pathologists and occupational therapists are preparing a professional development opportunity for support staff on the December 1 early release.
- c. By the time you are reading this, I am hopeful that our new school psychologist for the SU and speech language pathologist for Cabot (both remote) will have started.

2. AOE Updates

a. The FY25 Act 173 Service Plan documentation was uploaded to the AOE by the October 20, 2023 deadline. This document provides information about anticipated extraordinary reimbursement for the school year 2024-2025. As Mike Concessi mentioned during budget discussions, extraordinary reimbursement is received after costs exceed \$66,206.

a. Tracy Davidson is the Medicaid coordinator in the central office. I would like to recognize her for her dedication, dependability, and hard work. Tracy always has a smile and a positive attitude. She offers to go above and beyond on a regular basis and I know I can count on her for anything.

Community Meetings

Community meetings at all levels are up and running. Elementary is doing community meetings as a PreK team, K-2, and 3-5. There are approximately 5 of these a year. We also hold K-5 community meetings all together. We are planning to have 3 this year. We had our first K-5 community meeting all together on November 1st. Elementary Students enjoyed seeing all the classes and staff across the elementary. We ended our time dancing together! Middle school meets weekly as a community to share updates and celebrations. Middle school also uses this time to problem solve issues that affect students throughout the wing; right now, they are developing proposals for sustainable snack offerings. High school meets monthly for community meetings. We start off with announcements and appreciations, then move to a student-led community building activity. This month's activities were led by students in Charlie Wanzer's and Joanna Fowler's TAs. Our group topic for November is appropriate cell phone usage in school. More information will

Elementary just celebrated Twin Day for wing wide celebration. Our elementary wing is rocking it and focused on following TUS expectations. Way to go Elementary! Our next wing celebration that students are working toward is tape day.

Reviewing, Revising, and Refreshing Proficiency-based Learning at Twinfield



High school staff is beginning the process of revising our proficiency-based learning system and graduation requirements. This system has provided multiple opportunities and challenges. As many schools are doing now, we are looking critically at how our systems are meeting the needs of students and revamping as needed. We are currently working with an educational consultant to help us navigate this work and to connect us with other schools who have taken both similar and different approaches to proficiency-based learning.

Period Products at Twinfield

In response to the VT Digger article: <u>Grace Marroquin: Why students need better access to period</u> products in school - VTDigger

Right now, there are period products in the girls and gender neutral bathrooms throughout the school. Our school nurse provides them and restocks as needed. There are students in each area of the school that feel comfortable asking for a resupply from Alice as well.

As part of their health class, 5th grade students learn about puberty, including menstruation. Last year, Deb Gonyaw partnered with classroom teachers to talk about topics that are frequently taboo and worked with students to explore and test different self-care products. They then had a chance to build their own self-care kits. Pads were an option for those kits. All students regardless of gender learned about period products including pads, tampons, period underwear, and maybe menstrual cups.

The one request that we haven't addressed yet is having a wider range of products/absorbency levels available in the bathrooms. As we have more gender neutral/fluid and trans male students using the boys bathrooms, we will have period products available in those bathrooms too.

There has been an increase in both availability and cost of products. Prior to COVID, our nurse Alice offered products in the nurse's office. As we were trying to limit movement throughout the building during COVID, these products were supplied in all girls' bathrooms as is still the case.

Pumpkin Walk:




BIPOC Affinity Groups:
